Clerks Report

- 1. Clerk is waiting to receive a response from the Asset Manager at Bucks Council stating in relation to our request about undertaking the work on the Pedestal Monument, adding it to the Asset Register and future liability.
- 2. Clerk has been communicating with the Cabinet member for the Environment on the continuing inefficient bin collection service.
- 3. Clerk had reported the poor state of the double yellow lines and zig zag markings at the school these have all been repainted during the school holiday.
- 4. Clerk reported the water leak at Kittys Lodge was eventually repaired after contacting the CEO of Thames Water.
- 5. Clerk requested a price for cutting the bank on Towerage Lane (Sands end) and clearing the grips on Church Lane from the top of the hill, cutting back the shrubs and hedging at the entrance to the houses on Church Lane and the verge from The Pound all the work was undertaken in August.
- 6. Clerk had conducted an inspection of allotments and written to three tenants about the state of their plots all three tenants have responded and work undertaken. We have one half plot vacant now. Rent invoices will go out at in September.
- 7. The wild flower survey went ahead in the Community Orchard support from two parish families otherwise Chiltern Ranger volunteers.

A4010 Bradenham Road speed limit

Having seen the temporary reduction to 30mph on the Bradenham Road when the tarmac melted and for a short time after the repair, a local resident asked if we could consider asking for a permanent speed reduction.

The road was considered in an Area Speed Review in 2004/5, which we participated in. It was also considered by County and District Councillors Thames Valley Police and County Highways Officers.

Once the speeds were agreed it went out to Statutory Consultation. The guidelines in place at the time have been superseded. Speed limits are usually implemented by an increase in pedestrian movements or a residential area- this would account for the 40mph in front of the main row of houses. 50mph is considered acceptable on rural/non rural roads if collected speed date supports it.

Buckinghamshire Council are not considering any further speed limit assessments. If the Parish Council wanted to consider this, then we would have to pay for it with possible financial help from the Community Board. The full cost of changing a speed limit is in excess of £10,000.

We aim to propose a pattern of wards for Buckinghamshire Council which delivers:

- Electoral equality: each councillor represents a similar number of electors.
- Community identity: reflects the identity and interests of local communities.
- Effective and convenient local government: helping your council discharge its responsibilities effectively.

A good pattern of wards should:

- Provide good electoral equality, with each councillor representing, as closely as possible, the same number of electors.
- Reflect community interests and identities and include evidence of community links.
- Be based on strong, easily identifiable boundaries.
- Help the council deliver effective and convenient local government.

Electoral equality

 Does your proposal mean that councillors would represent roughly the same number of electors as elsewhere in the council area?

Community identity

- **Transport links:** are there good links across your proposed ward? Is there any form of public transport?
- Community groups: is there a parish council, residents association or another group that represents the area?
- Facilities: does your pattern of wards reflect where local people go for shops, medical services, leisure facilities etc?

Draft Recommendations on the new electoral

arrangements

Who we are

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's electors ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

Why Buckinghamshire?

 The Commission is carrying out an electoral review of Buckinghamshire Council to deliver electoral equality for electors across Buckinghamshire, after being established as a unitary authority.

Our proposals

 We propose that the council should have 98 councillors in future, 10 three-councillor wards, 27 two-councillor wards and 14 single-councillor wards.

You have until 10 October 2022 to have your say on the recommendations

Summary of our recommendations

Our draft recommendations propose that Buckinghamshire Council should have 98 councillors.

Those councillors should represent 51 wards, represented by 10 three-councillor wards, 27 two-councillor wards and 14 single-councillor wards.

Before drawing up the draft recommendations, the Commission carried out a public consultation inviting proposals for a new pattern of wards for Buckinghamshire.

We have considered all of the submissions we received during that phase of consultation. The boundaries of most wards should change.


